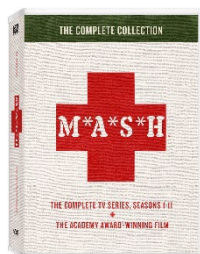


M*A*S*H Episode Guide (1972–1983)

SEASON 1



Episode 1-1 *S1, Ep1 Pilot* (0:25) Episode aired 17 Sep. 1972

The Swamp's Korean houseboy, Ho-Jon, is accepted to attend school at Hawkeye's alma mater. The camp raises money to send Ho-Jon to Maine by raffling a weekend in Tokyo with a nurse, much to the chagrin of Hot Lips and Burns.

Episode 1-2 *To Market, to Market* (0:25) Episode aired 24 Sep. 1972

After losing vital medical supplies to black marketeers, Hawkeye and Trapper attempt to make a deal to get them back. Henry gets a new antique oak desk.

Episode 1-3 *Requiem for a Lightweight* (0:25) Episode aired 1 Oct. 1972

Trapper enters the inter-camp boxing tournament.

Episode 1-4 *Chief Surgeon Who?* (0:25) Episode aired 8 Oct. 1972

When Hawkeye is appointed Chief Surgeon over Frank Burns, Burns and Houlihan go over Col. Blake's head to a general to protest the decision.

Episode 1-5 *The Moose* (0:25) Episode aired 15 Oct. 1972

Hawkeye is outraged when a visiting sergeant brings his 'moose' to camp - a young Korean woman he has bought to keep as his personal servant.

Episode 1-6 *Yankee Doodle Doctor* (0:25) Episode aired 22 Oct. 1972

The 4077th is chosen as the site for a documentary featuring 'false heroics' about MASH units in Korea. After destroying the film, Hawkeye and Trapper make their own movie as a replacement.

Episode 1-7 *Bananas, Crackers and Nuts* (0:25) Episode aired 5 Nov. 1972

Hawkeye feigns insanity to prove he needs a leave.

Episode 1-8 *Cowboy* (0:25) Episode aired 5 Nov. 1972

A wounded cowboy is itching to get back to the states to keep his marriage intact, but his request is denied. Henry becomes the target of a mad bomber.

Episode 1-9 *Henry, Please Come Home* (0:25) Episode aired 19 Nov. 1972

When Col. Henry Blake is transferred to Tokyo and Frank starts imposing military discipline on the camp, the surgeons will do anything to get Henry back.

Episode 1-10 *I Hate a Mystery* (0:25) Episode aired 26 Nov. 1972

Hawkeye finds himself investigating a rash of petty thefts in the camp.

Episode 1-11 *Germ Warfare* (0:25) Episode aired 10 Dec. 1972

After tapping Frank Burns for blood, Hawkeye and Trapper's patient develops complications. They believe Frank has hepatitis and try to keep him operating.

Episode 1-12 *Dear Dad* (0:25) Episode aired 17 Dec. 1972

Hawkeye writes his dad, describing the antics of the 4077th.

Episode 1-13 *Edwina* (0:25) Episode aired 24 Dec. 1972

The nurses refuse to date until their lonely colleague Edwina gets a date, so the men draw straws.

Episode 1-14 *Love Story* (0:25) Episode aired 7 Jan. 1973

After Radar gets a "Dear John" letter Hawkeye and Trapper try to help him with a new nurse who's into classical literature and music.

Episode 1-15 *Tuttle* (0:25) Episode aired 14 Jan. 1973

A little white lie about an imaginary officer balloons into an elaborate charade.

Episode 1-16 *The Ringbanger* (0:25) Episode aired 21 Jan. 1973

Hawkeye and Trapper hit it off with a wounded Colonel, but when they discover his combat zeal is costing lives, they conspire to keep him from returning to the front line.

Episode 1-17 *Sometimes You Hear the Bullet* (0:25) Episode aired 28 Jan. 1973

Hawkeye's childhood buddy drops by, and reveals that he is writing a book about his experiences in the infantry - experiences that may hit a little too close to home.

Episode 1-18 *Dear Dad, Again* (0:25) Episode aired 4 Feb. 1973

Hawkeye is bored and tired, the best time to pen another missive to his father. He describes Klinger's sheer white wedding gown, which does little to hide his white boxer shorts but is better than Hawkeye's naked dining fiasco. There is more fun to be had over Hotlips' recent tiff with Frank; he got drunk on gin and confided that his own brother used to call him Ferret Face. Radar is now a real, honest to goodness mail order graduate. But, Captain Casey, the new boy genius of their surgical team, is not really a doctor; Hawkeye's failure to throw the book at him causes Casey to reassess his career choices: and an R.C. priest named Schwartz is born. Henry conducts the doctors playing and Hotlips singing "My Blue Heaven" but no one is listening. Hotlips is really selling it, but it is hard to get the Army behind any color but olive drab. Hawkeye pens another letter to his father, detailing the day-to-day insanity of living in the camp, including a bet with Trapper that nobody will notice if Hawkeye dines naked. A new surgeon, Captain Casey, does brilliant work but has dubious credentials.

Episode 1-19 *The Longjohn Flap* (0:25) Episode aired 18 Feb. 1973

A cold snap has everybody trying to get their hands on Hawkeye's thermal underwear.

Episode 1-20 *The Army-Navy Game* (0:25) Episode aired 25 Feb. 1973

After tapping Frank Burns for blood, Hawkeye and Trapper's patient develops complications. They believe Frank has hepatitis and try to keep him operating.

Episode 1-21 *Sticky Wicket* (0:25) Episode aired 4 Mar. 1973

Hawkeye moves out of the Swamp while brooding over a patient gone sour, while Frank rubs salt in the wound after suffering Hawkeye's insults to his surgical ability.

Episode 1-22 *Major Fred C. Dobbs* (0:25) Episode aired 11 Mar. 1973

Frank applies for a transfer out of the 4077, and Hawkeye and Trapper can't resist broadcasting his goodbye to Margaret through the camp P.A. The prospect of gold in the region gives Frank second thoughts.

Episode 1-23 *Ceasefire* (0:25) Episode aired 18 Mar. 1973

The camp erupts into celebration when they receive word that there's a ceasefire.

Episode 1-24 *Showtime* (0:25) Episode aired 25 Mar. 1973

USO troupe entertains the 4077th in between the usual chaos.

SEASON 2

Episode 2-1 *Divided We Stand* (0:25) Episode aired 15 Sep. 1973

Henry's orders to the 4077th to be on their best behavior when General Clayton sends a psychiatrist to evaluate them meet with mixed results. Will the team be broken up and sent to other units?

Episode 2-2 *5 O'Clock Charlie* (0:25) Episode aired 22 Sep 1973

Every day for the past six weeks, at 5:00 o'clock p.m. on the nose, a North Korean "washout from Kamikaze school" has let loose a bomb in the general direction of the hospital's sub-ammo dump. Very affectionately known as "Five O'Clock Charlie," the only thing he hits on the nose is the time. Every day, Radar opens book on the day's exploits and takes bets on how close (in yards) Charlie will come to the sub-ammo dump. It is an occasion for cocktails and frivolity at 4077, not unlike the Kentucky Derby... until Frank demands Henry get him a "nug" from Brigadier Gen. Clayton. Capt. Phil Cardozo, the singing dentist, gives the drunken duo a new slant on things. If there is anything that will beat Frank and his nug, it is 4 dozen sheets, 18 gallons of mercurochrome and a little thing called psychology.

Episode 2-3 *Radar's Report* (0:25) Episode aired 29Sep 1973

The 4077th is chosen as the site for a documentary featuring 'false heroics' about MASH units in Korea. After destroying the film, Hawkeye and Trapper make their own movie as a replacement.

Episode 2-4 *For the Good of the Outfit* (0:25) Episode aired 6 Oct 1973

Hawkeye and Trapper discover that a nearby town has been shelled by U.S. forces. When they pursue the issue, the army resists accepting responsibility.

After Hawkeye is kept awake in surgery for 3 days straight he decides to find out who started the war.

A wounded Korean boy captures the hearts of the 4077th especially Trapper who wants to adopt him.

Episode 2-7 *L.I.P. (Local Indigenous Personnel)* (0:25) Episode aired 27 Oct 1973

Hawkeye helps a soon-to-be-discharged enlisted man who wants to marry a Korean girl and take her and their child back to the U.S.

Episode 2-8 *The Trial of Henry Blake* (0:25) Episode aired 3 Nov 1973

Henry's on trial on charges that Frank and Margaret brought against him. So that Hawkeye and Trapper can't help Henry, the Majors put them under house arrest.

Episode 2-9 *Dear Dad* (0:25) Episode aired 10 Nov 1973

Hawkeye writes his dad, describing the antics of the 4077th.

Episode 2-10 *The Sniper* (0:25) Episode aired 17 Nov 1973

The 4077th deals with more than the usual mayhem when a sniper opens fire on the camp.

Episode 2-11 *Carry On, Hawkeye* (0:25) Episode aired 24 Nov. 1973

Episode 2-15 *Officers Only* (0:25) Episode aired 22 Dec. 1973

In gratitude for Hawkeye and Trapper saving his son, a general donates an officer's club to the 4077th. Hawkeye and Trapper work to allow everyone access to the club.

Episode 2-16 *Henry in Love* (0:25) Episode aired 5 Jan. 1974

Family man Henry falls in love with 20-year-old ex-cheerleader Nancy Sue Parker, who is less than half his age. Nancy visits Henry at the camp and comes on to Hawkeye while Henry is in surgery.

Episode 2-17 *For Want of a Boot* (0:25) Episode aired Jan 12, 1974

After months of waiting, Hawkeye finds that it may take more than a requisition form to get a new pair of boots..

Episode 2-18 *Operation Noselift* (0:25) Episode aired Jan 19, 1974

Another day, another complaint to Gen. Mitchell, compliments of Hotlips, Inc. and Henry is tired of their constant abuse. To make matters worse, Private Danny Baker keeps going AWOL. With the help of Fr. Mulcahy, Hawkeye and Trapper get to the bottom of Baker's trouble: his huge nose. Hawkeye calls his old buddy, renowned plastic surgeon, Major Stanley "Stosh" Robbins, (Stuart Margolin) to perform the surgery...in exchange for a date with "The Barracuda." The big problem: all elective surgery is against U.S. military regulations. Hotlips, Inc. are very suspicious. But promises were made and contingency plans laid. Will Baker get a new nose? Will Stosh meet The Barracuda? Dig through all of the white tape to find out!

SEASON 3

[Episode 3-1 *The General Flipped at Dawn*](#) (0:25) Episode aired Sep 10, 1974

A visiting general, appearing to be more eccentric than the usual army brass and a stickler for regulations, tries to move the camp closer to the front and court martial Hawkeye before they discover that he's completely loony.

[Episode 3-2 *Rainbow Bridge*](#) (0:25) Episode aired Sep 17, 1974

Hawkeye and Trapper are Tokyo-bound, Frank is jealous; but Trapper wants 3 days without amputating something. Father and Henry bring shopping lists but Radar brings news of more casualties. Thirty-six hours and 473 cases later (an all time record) Henry tells the officers about an unusual radio call Radar took from the Chinese. The Chinese have 9 shot-up GIs they are willing to free...but only if unarmed doctors, a corpsman and a driver travel 50 miles into Chinese territory in one vehicle to retrieve the GIs. All must be totally without weaponry. Margaret and Frank do not trust the offer, but Hawkeye believes it. He knows the Chinese realize the 4077 treats their wounded Chinese well and believes the Chinese are trying to give their GIs a break. Radar is to drive the bus with doctors, Hawkeye and Trapper, and a volunteer corpsman, Klinger. Smelling a commendation, Hotlips urges Frank to volunteer and arms him with all kinds of courage. So, five Americans meet a group of Chinese... but they are armed to the teeth with Russian weaponry. Is this an elaborate hoax or a fool's errand? Or is a group of men doing something decent in the middle of a giant indecency?
